

Here is John's Farewell message to us:

'As I look back on the last 7 or so years here at St Andrew's, it's been a very encouraging time for me, and in some respects quite challenging.

As most of you know, my beginnings in my walk with the Lord were Baptist. I could not have had a better start. Steeped in Bible Studies and Prayer, it gave me the foundations all followers of Jesus really need if you want to grow in your Faith.

This is progressing, but the process is proving rather slow. We have been working on the job description and employment contract and we are now working on the budget. Before we can advertise the position, this budget has to be approved, first by the local congregation and then by Presbytery. We hope to do this soon.

Monday Meals Update

(from Meals supervisor, Maureen Kerr.)

"Mercury Bay Community Meals continue to be prepared in St Andrew's kitchen, and since Covid hit, they are served as frozen takeaway meals on Monday afternoons, from 3:30 to 5 pm. We reheat the meals for those who have no access to cooking facilities, such as those who have no home. At this stage the Trust members are sharing the cooking duties. "People stop and chat, and we get to know the families in their various situations, some of which are quite dire. There is a very high incidence of 'P' (methamphetamine) in Whitianga which leads to dysfunctional families. Some elderly people who for whatever reason cannot cook for themselves, also collect meals, and a few are delivered to their homes. We make applications for bulk funding and we try to buy locally. We get generous gifts of food from time to time, smoked fish, vegetables etc. Any excess veges are distributed to the families.

"I really feel we are feeding people spiritually as well as physically. This is the Lord's work."

Please note – No Meals distribution on Easter Monday Meals will be available instead on Tuesday April 6th.

St Andrew's Op Shop

The church op shop is now open again, after being closed for one week for recarpeting and interior painting. It was a mammoth effort on the part of the Op-shop ladies and their supporting men, to clear everything out of the shop and remove all the fixtures. Thank you team!

We crammed everything into the Hamilton Room, and after carpeting, moved it all out again. The winter boxes were opened up, and the shop re-stocked with winter bargains. All left-over summer stock has been gifted to other charities, as we do every year. We do not carry over stock from year to year – everything is fresh on the racks, thanks to the generosity of this caring community.

Damon Christensen is now testing and certifying small electric appliances, so they can now legally be sold.

So it's time to come and check out the shop (behind the church) which supports not only St Andrew's Fellowship, but also other churches in Whitianga, as well as many local community groups. The latest community

donation (last month) was \$500 to Whitianga Playcentre. Our helpers represent several churches, and some are not church folk – but the work brings us together and gives us great satisfaction. To coin Noel Hewlett's famous phrase, "It's the best little shop in town."
