Our people and their stories: Elizabeth Cosgrave

Kia ora. My name is Elizabeth Cosgrave. I joined the congregation here at St Andrews when I moved to Whitianga with my husband Vance in March 2021.

I was born in Kingsbridge, Devon, the eldest of five daughters. I had a happy childhood, living close to the coast and helping Mum and Dad in their busy baker's shop. Dad was brought up Anglican and there were uncles who were youth leaders, but it was principally my Mother who was my faith role model.



Mum belonged to the Brethren congregation, but she was always questioning, searching her beliefs. My maternal grandfather and others were Lay Preachers.

I enjoyed my school days and am still in touch with friends across the miles from that time. I enjoyed Sunday school. Some of the choruses I learnt are still sung at times. I loved collecting the attendance stamps; alas I am not sure what happened to all those little books.

I joined the Girls Brigade and enjoyed many great camps, nurturing a real appreciation for the beauty of the countryside, with the *Observer* books. always present in my Mother's pocket to help extend our learning. I was confirmed at age 12 at St Mary Anglican Church, but my understanding of its significance was limited. In my Teenage years I joined the Red Cross as a cadet and helped on the beach with First Aid. I gained a Bronze Award in the Duke of Edinburgh Scheme which also led me into learning about the Police Service. At this time I was planning to become a nurse.

The late sixties were a fun time in Britain, the Beatles were our heroes, disco's and dancing. Earning pocket money to spend on fashion and records was exciting and empowering. It was at this time I met my exhusband. I never became a nurse. We married and had our two children, Shane and Sarah, working hard to provide a home, but alas our marriage did not stay happy and ended badly. My faith was my rock at this time and the Vicar at our local church and my wonderful employer Joe, with my lovely Dad, restored my faith.

Financially times were tough but as a friend once told me —be thankful you have just enough -it makes you far more creative. So true! I learnt to cook, garden, knit and sew. I remember my Dad telling me, "For goodness sake, you can turn a chicken into a turkey with a piece of holly," when I tried to complain about the cost of Christmas. So I made a table decoration with candles and the chicken was delicious!! My mum was creative and made crackers.

As time passed friends took me out and I met Vance, also born in Devon, on holiday from New Zealand. We got on well straight away. In a whirlwind I was married and on my way to New Zealand with my/our two children, then aged 10 and 8. I was 31. Vance had moved to NZ as an adult. His Kiwi Dad had been in the NZ navy when he had met his Mum in the UK. Vance had been a choir boy in the church I attended, with his brothers, and had enjoyed his time in the scout movement. He also loved football which was already a passion of my son.

NZ in 1985 was very different from the place it is today. I was very homesick. We made our home in Hamilton as Vance had a job there, and I got involved in social work. We both missed living on the coast, but Tauranga seemed out of reach for us. We were then blessed with a daughter, Laura who completed our family unit.

As adulthood approached for the older kids we planned to downsize and bought a bach on Waiheke Island. It wasn't long before we were renting our Hamilton home and living in our bach. We look back on those days and wonder how we did it- Vance commuting to Mt Wellington where he worked for Pilkington Glass. We loved the island. An opportunity opened for me and I trained as an Early Childhood teacher. They were happy times. With our older children now married with families of their own, we began

to realise we were too far away from them. We moved to Tauranga, settling eventually in Omokoroa. We moved again temporarily to Auckland to be a support for our daughter who was at University. We also lived in the King Country for a while and Vance re trained as a Prison Officer. We then returned to our home in Omokoroa but never really settled back. It was no longer the small coastal community.

I had a lovely position as Manager of the Ark Christian Centre at Holy Trinity Church in Tauranga, but with commuting taking longer and our home now too big for two, we decided to retire to Gisborne. I trained to be a companion in the *Seasons* programme whilst there, supporting children and adults working through grief. Over the years I have been involved in several volunteer agencies, including *Youthline* and *Living Without Violence* which I did for several years. Vance and I were also foster parents for a while in Hamilton. These various trainings have deepened my faith, taught me to meet people where they are at, and deepened my understanding.

After a lovely Christmas with our son and his family in Whitianga, a bit of pressure from our daughter to move closer to Auckland, and the pandemic affecting our freedoms, we decided to move to Whitianga.

We found an apartment which is perfect for us. Vance now has a part-time mail delivery job, and I can now be found working in the Op Shop, or weeding the garden surrounding it. I also volunteer for the Mercury Bay Community Patrol.

I love that the Church here at St Andrews is so welcoming and is active within the community, putting our values and beliefs into action.

Through my studies in Treaty of Waitangi I learnt that the Marae is the place for Tangata Whenua to stand in the world. The church is a place for us all to stand. It's a timeless place, a peaceful place and a place where we can all feel accepted and loved. This is a lovely place to call home.


Welcome, Vance and Elizabeth, and thank you for sharing your story.

Leading the service on May 8th, Julie told us this story:

Revelation Chapter 7.

"As I read this passage, I vividly remembered an afternoon at school, when I was about 6 years old. Every day after lunch, the teacher set us to read, while she worked with the reading groups.

This particular day I had chosen the story of Hansel and Gretel. As I turned the pages, I became more and more anxious as the story unfolded. The children were lost in the wood. Then I got to the part where the witch appeared, and caught the children eating her house made of cookies and sweets. She was horrible! She caught hold of the children, and kept Hansel prisoner – to fatten him up! Then came the worst bit of all. 'Tomorrow,' she cackled, 'I am going to eat Hansel!'

At that point I shut the book and burst into loud tears. The teacher came and sat beside me and was finally able to discover what had upset me so much. She persuaded me to open the book again, and she took me to the end of the story. 'See,' she said, 'It has a really happy ending. The children were reunited with their father; the wicked witch and the cruel stepmother were dead.' From then on, whenever I read it, I just had to trust the ending. I could be brave in the scary parts, knowing for certain that a satisfactory ending was coming."
