Our people and their stories - Ross and Jo Millar

Ross and Jo have strong connections with St Andrew's fellowship, and Ross often challenges us (and makes us work) with his unique discussionstyle preaching. Jo has written their story. Ross and Jo grew up in Hamilton where we both went to University, met, married and stayed. We've lived in the same house in Fairfield for 28. vears. Despite this we would like to think we are not boring! We would like to think our experience is focused, rather than wide-ranging! Ross was born in Matamata (not high in the



Hobbiton. That's down the road a bit, although, he is on the short side.... After a few years his family moved to Cambridge. Ross has one younger brother, Craig. His father started the Brass Band in Cambridge, and both boys were brought up playing in the band. Craig is now a Music teacher and composer in Australia, while Ross has barely touched an instrument since leaving home.

He was very involved in the local Presbyterian Church, with both his parents being Elders. Although Ross knew God was real, he didn't make his own commitment until he was at university, when he felt that God challenged him to ask Jesus into his life. A cup of coffee was involved, I believe! Almost as importantly, Ross and I met. I invited him to the University Christian group, which kept up his involvement with God. Ross did a science degree in statistics and computing, and then trained as a Secondary Teacher. He taught maths and computing in Hamilton for 3 years before he decided it was not for him.

I (Jo) was born in Ashburton near Christchurch, where my Dad (Alistair Rogers) was sole teacher in a little country school. We soon moved to Rewarewa, another little country school near Otorohanga in rolling sheep country, and then later to Leigh, a seaside village north of Auckland. By this time Mum, Pat, had 3 little girls. When I was ten our little brother Matthew joined us - a great toy for us to play with! Leigh was a lovely place, with lots of swimming, bare feet and bikes: happy memories. I went with my sisters to the local Hall for Sunday School, and sometimes the family went to the local church, with monthly services for Anglicans, Presbyterians, Methodists, and Catholics.

When I was 9 or 10 I read a Gospel booklet, realised it was true, and committed to being a Christian. Our family moved again to Matamata, and when I was 15 Sarah was born. She was very well mothered with three big sisters, and a big brother! A while after I left home Pat, Alistair and family moved to Whenuakite, where Alistair was Headmaster. When the Whenuakite Hall closed, they became faithful members of St Andrews by the Sea.

With no idea what I wanted to do, I ended up at Waikato University studying psychology, sociology and education. I enjoyed it, but had a longing to be doing something for God, so early in the 2nd year I left University (even though Ross and study were both quite interesting!) and did a Discipleship Training Course with Youth With A Mission (YWAM). Afterwards I came back to Hamilton, and worked and studied part time for the Next 10 years.

Ross and I got married in 1985. After 3 years teaching maths and computing, Ross felt led to join ACT Theatre Company, a ministry of Youth With A Mission. I agreed, so off we went to DTS (second time for me!) We then joined YWAM in Hamilton. Ross became a Missionary Actor, and I became a Mum to Jeremy, and then Cameron, finally finishing my Bachelors degree in about 1992. Later Lauren and Hannah came along and our family was complete.

After 4½ years, our time with YWAM and ACT came to an end, and Ross got a job as a computing tutor at Puketaha Training Farm, a second-chance education provider, based in Hamilton. One of his classes was a group of Deaf students, and Ross realised the Deaf have no written language of their own. Ross was shocked: how can they read their Bible? His passion for sign languages began. Ross developed his own educational database, then joined a database company. By this time we had bought a house in Fairfield near to Ross's work, our church, and local schools, where we have lived ever since. It's a poor area with some big challenges, but we feel it is where we are meant to be. Long term in the community we have developed good relationships and an understanding of some of the challenges people face. We aim to be salt and light where we can.



Alistair Begg posed the hypothetical question - How would that thief answer the angel at the gate of Heaven — 'Why should I let you in?' This thief might not have known Jesus at all. The only answer he could possibly give, would be:

"The Man on the middle cross said I could come."

Surely this is the only answer any of us will be able to give. Nothing in this world can ever make us worthy



of entering the Kingdom, except by invitation. But from the cross, *Jesus says* we can come. And as amazing as it might seem, "The Kingdom is within you." Manawa Kai Heart Food Kitchen



This is the new name for our Community Meals.

'Monday Meals' originated in 2008 from a 'Vision Day' led by Rev. Mary Petersen. It was a huge step of faith. The meals were cooked 'marae style' in the St Andrew's kitchen with everyone welcome to come and help. People were encouraged to eat together and the hall tables were set up with tablecloths and flowers. Placemats bore Bible verses. Donations of food began to roll in and we could see the Lord's hand in this. When the work grew too much for our small group, we employed a cook. The Mercury Bay Community Support Trust had been set up in 2000 by Rev Stan Stewart, primarily to fund Day Camp, and eventually the Trust also took over the meals mission, which then became 'Mercury Bay Community Meals'. It became too difficult to serve plated meals through Covid, so they were all distributed as takeaways, and this has proved to be much more efficient.

Now, the meals have another name. 'Manawa Kai' meaning 'heart food'. The name has resonated with the community and the demand for meals has grown. Last week 200 meals were distributed. Still cooked in the St Andrew's kitchen and mainly distributed between 2 -4 pm on Mondays, frozen meals are available for emergency needs at other times. With rising food prices, funding for the meals is becoming increasingly difficult. Please pray for this mission, which started in faith and has continued to be a blessing to many in this community.

St Andrew's AGM was held after service on Sunday September 17th attended by 16 hardy members, many having escaped! The Reports were distributed a week earlier, and taken as read. There were no contentious issues. It seems we are all happy to keep the status quo as a Local Ministry Team, and we enjoy the various preaching styles of those who fill our pulpit. With no ordained minister to pay and the manse rented to a young family, the Parish account is looking good. Our manse needs work, and we are arranging a Healthy Homes inspection so we will know the extent of work needed.

All Parish Councillors agreed to stand for a further term. Parish Chairman, Kevin Pringle thanked everyone for their dedicated work and support.

We attended Fairfield Presbyterian Church from University days. Ross joined the lay preaching team which he really enjoyed. He applied to train to be a minister in the Presbyterian Church, but was not accepted. Probably too quirky! We joined Wycliffe Bible Translators intending to work with NZ Sign Language, but progress has been slow. We both trained in Bible Story Telling through Wycliffe, and this has strongly influenced Ross's 'preaching' style. Ross continued to write, perform and direct plays, coached secondary school teams, wrote and performed poetry, and each Easter at Stations of the Cross in the Hamilton Gardens, Ross mysteriously appeared, recited poems, and melted back into the bushes. Ross studied at Bible College (now Laidlaw) and gained a Masters in Theology. His Thesis compared the Lord's Prayer in the NT Greek, with signing done by Deaf church leaders.

When Hannah, our youngest went to school I got a part-time job at the local Kindy, working mainly in the office for the next 19 years. For a year I grew lots of native seedlings, and then got a job at the local Community House next door as the admin person, a role which I enjoy very much. I feel like I finally know what I want to do when I grow up!

In 2011 our second son Cameron drowned in a kayaking accident in Wellington Harbour. He was nearly 20. Cameron was very creative, quirky, and kind, and we miss him very much. Jeremy is married and has two children. Lauren is a costumier in Auckland. Next year the youngest, Hannah, is getting married. Soon after I started work again, Ross became a fulltime student so that he could continue his passion to develop a written form for sign language. He has a plan to develop a "sign processor" – like a word processor, but for writing sign languages. The best way to do this seems to be to do a Doctorate with the University of Auckland, so that is his goal going forward. He hopes to develop a tool that will be a huge help to Deaf people round the world.

In 2021 Pat and Alistair, my Mum and Dad, left Whenuakite, and St Andrew's to live in the Granny flat at the back of our house. We love having them close. For both of us, the best way to live is to keep close to God, and live life the way He wants us to live.
