Our people and their stories - Mary Hall



Mary joined our fellowship when she moved to Whitianga with her husband Geoff in 2015. Sadly, Geoff died very recently. Our prayers are with Mary as she courageously shares their story: Mary grew up in a place few of us have ever heard of – Lumphinnans, near Dunfermline in Scotland. (We love her Scots accent.) She was the second of nine children. Her parents, Jessie and George Gorniak were not church-goers but Mary and her sisters used to like go to the local

Salvation Army on Sundays. "We enjoyed it, and it was somewhere to go on Sundays."

Mary went to Beath High School and left at 15 to become a machinist in a clothing factory – a skill that she followed for 40 years! Her best friend was Agnes, and she boarded with Agnes' Mum. "We loved dancing," Mary says. "We lived close to the Rosyth Naval Base. We used to go to dances there and danced with the Navy boys."

Geoff Hall was one of those handsome Navy boys. Mary was 20 and Geoff was 21 when they met. He was from Worcester. "Three times he asked me to marry him," Mary says. "The third time, he told me was getting posted to Portsmouth and was going away. So then I said Yes." In 1973, just one year after they met, Mary married Geoff at Crossgates Church. There was no time for a honeymoon. Newly married, they shifted to the Portsmouth Naval Base and it became clear that Geoff, as a marine engineer, would be spending a lot of time away on the ships.

"Geoff was a good man. He loved being in the Navy but he didn't want to leave me. So he gave it up and we moved to his home town in Worcester." Geoff took a job in a factory, but he hated it. There were now two little girls in the family. Laurna was born in 1976 and Sophie in 77. Mary had her hands full, but she went back to work as a machinist as soon as she could. "I was reading the paper one day and saw an advertisement inviting applications for the New Zealand Navy. I persuaded Geoff to apply, and of course, he got in. We came to Devonport Naval Base in 1980. It took us three years to really settle in, but we weren't too homesick. Geoff loved the Navy and we had a lovely home in Northcote." Mary once again took a job as a machinist in Takapuna. She had not connected with a church since the early Salvation Army days, but their girls were both baptised in England and they went to Sunday School at a little church in Northcote. Mary became concerned because the Pastor was putting a lot of pressure on the children about having to be saved. "I told

them, Don't worry. Jesus knows all about you."

"There were no dances, but there were lots of parties at the Naval Base. The Junior Ratings' Mess had better parties than the Seniors' Mess." Geoff had to be away on the ships for long periods, all round the Pacific and beyond, so Mary and the girls had to get on with life without him for a lot of the time. "I just loved being a Mum. I still do." And of course, she made all their clothes and loved dressing the girls.

With another Naval couple, Mary and Geoff came to Whitianga for a holiday in the late '80's. "We all had kids, and we stayed in a motel. It rained and rained, and we spent the week penned up indoors. We didn't see much of the area, but we liked what we saw of it." At age 40 Mary was diagnosed with the onset of Multiple Sclerosis. It was a devastating blow for them. "I didn't feel unwell, but I got attacks every six months or so." For years Mary was having injections every week, but she felt they were not helping, so she stopped them.

Mary and Geoff bought their own home in Glenfield. Geoff was still in the Navy and the girls were both doing well at school. Mary was coping with her MS and she got a job that she really loved, as a machinist for Zeus Sportswear. "There were only four machinists and the Boss was a lovely man." When Geoff retired from the Navy they moved to Rotorua, into a house that was specially set up for Mary's condition. As the disease progressed she had to use a wheelchair. "We were not really happy in Rotorua. We were too far away from the girls. They both had their own homes by this time, and the grandchildren were coming along." Sophie lived in Auckland and Laurna had taken a job with TCDC and moved to Kuaotunu. So the decision was made, to come to Whitianga – previously seen only in the rain!

Mary and Geoff bought a home in Seascape Ave and that was when we first met Mary at St Andrew's. This brave lady came to church all on her own, in a wheelchair of course, and we welcomed her with open arms. "I don't know what brought me to church - I just know I needed to come - just for me." The kitchen at Seascape Ave proved to be too small for Mary to get around, so they moved to a lovely home in Acacia Court, with a spacious kitchen and lovely decks. The grandchildren are all in their teens now, and they often visit.

It was a terrible blow when Geoff was diagnosed with an aggressive cancer earlier this year. Mary has suffered a devastating loss, but she is getting through with the help of her girls, her carers and her friends. "I just can't believe he's gone," she says.

Mary would love to come to church more often, but very often she can't get ready in time to come. "I do enjoy coming to church, everyone is very friendly. I don't know much about the Bible, but I do know Someone up there gets me through."

Her door is always open for visitors. Mary is well cared for in her own home, and she is brave. "I'm a strong woman," she says, and we all agree with that!

Thank you Mary. You are always in our prayers.

Ministry with the aged is ... underrated and undervalued in the Church, yet it should be regarded with a sense of urgency and priority. Ministry with older people presents both a challenge and a rich opportunity, if only we can see it and grasp it..."
