Our people and their stories -

A meditation on the Pohutukawa, by Brigid Clark

Here in Mercury Bay we have all remarked on the beauty and profusion of the pohutukawa, which bless our town, and seemed to be particularly lush and vibrant this year.

Our friend Brigid wrote the following meditation some years ago and used it in worship when she lived in New Plymouth. When telling about how it came to be



written, Brigid said she kept going back time and time again to examine it more closely, and every time she looked Brigid found some new beauty, some new truth revealed.

It is a treasure worth sharing....

'Today I want to focus on a tree – not just any tree, but the pohutukawa tree that is a common sight up and down the coast. During its time of flowering, this tree has a story all of its own – pointing the way to Jesus – and in using this picture today I want to thank and praise God for His creation, and how it speaks to our hearts.

The psalmist says, "Great are the works of the Lord; they are pondered by all who delight in them.' Here is the prayer:

'Thank you Lord God, that the connection between the Creator and the created is so clearly visible. Our thoughts are drawn to the pohutukawa trees, with their blaze of red and green colours in December, as if they are heralding the Christmas season – heralding the birth of Jesus – reminding us of the depth of Your Love, in sending Your Son into the

world - the key to our salvation.

'Soft green leaves and clusters of buds ready to bloom represent new birth, new growth or fresh beginnings and we are reminded and thankful, that God has given us new birth into a living Hope, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade – kept in Heaven for each one of us.

'The buds open with varying shades of red. The deep crimson colour speaks of the heart of God the Father's Love for each one of us, and of His longing for us to come into a deeper relationship with Him - of His precious blood that was shed for us on the cross, as an atonement for our sins – that through His blood we are forgiven, washed clean, and renewed. The abundance of blooms more than demonstrates God's grace being lavished upon us.

'If the flowers are examined closely, they are made up of multiple soft spikes, the tip of each being dotted with gold, representing Christ in His rightful place, crowned with glory and honour, the King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

'We thank you Lord, that the beauty of each tree draws the eyes of the beholder to itself, in the same way the Living God draws us by His presence, power and love.

'The young saplings at the foot of the tree remind us of our children and grandchildren. Lord, we thank you for each one of them, asking that as they put down their roots, they will grow and be nourished by the Love and knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ.

'Only one tree out of all your creation Lord, but so much to ponder on, so much to thank you for. We praise you and thnk you for the glory of the Living God that is all around us. With the psalmist we say, 'How majestic is your Name in all the earth.' Amen.

Thank you Brigid, for sharing this meditation with us. We look forward to seeing more inspirations from your thoughtful pen.

From the Pulpit

On December 31st Ross McCook spoke about his work with 'Heart for Youth' Trust, which supports marginalised young people and helps them to face life's challenges. Ross described how the Lord had shown him that all of life is a jigsaw puzzle, and with the Lord's help every piece, good or bad, is fitted in place to make a complete picture.

But only the Lord can see the finished picture.

When we look back on our lives we can see how some experiences have taught us faith lessons, and prepared us for what the Lord has planned for us.

Ross said, "*This jigsaw has no edges* – it just keeps growing and growing, and it is limitless. There are no limits to what the Lord can do in our lives." Many young people feel hemmed in, prisoners of circumstance and this limits the way they look at the future, or believe in themselves. Young and old need to know that with the Lord in our lives, we can overcome life's obstacles and achieve the potential that only He sees. Learn more : heartforyouth.org.nz

On January 7th Rev Viv Coleman conducted our New Year Communion. She too, had a word to say about boundaries: "I heard of a farmer, visiting Australia from overseas. Confronted by the vastness of the Australian properties, the visitor asked, 'How do you manage to fence all this?' The land-owner answered, "In Australia we don't build fences, we build wells. The cattle don't go away."

That is a powerful message for any church! we work hard to 'attract' people to join the fellowship, but sometimes we fall into the trap of expecting too much and people are left with the feeling that they somehow don't come up to expectations. Let's remember that you don't have to know your Bible before you sit in the pew! Let's make the Fellowship a well of open-hearted friendship and loving concern.

Treaty Concerns

In recent days both the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches have put out letters and documents to Parishes in response to the growing unrest around perceived changes to the interpretation of Te Tirity O Waitangi. Copies of these letters are available at church, or request email versions from Dorothy.

The Presbyterian Moderator's Waitangi Day Letter includes the following extract from the Book of Order:

(4) The Church affirms that it is cross-cultural, in that it recognises that the richness of the Christian Gospel and its proclamation can be found in the sharing of experiences, wisdom and learning from many different cultures. The Church stands in opposition to any view that favours one culture over another as holding a monopoly on the interpretation or transmission of the Christian Gospel. In affirming the Church to be crosscultural, the Church is also affirming that the Christian Gospel creates community across cultures.'

Bible Society New Zealand announces a transformative journey to ensure our mission's enduring impact.

After more than 30 years, the Bible Society offices in Wellington will close on 31 March. All services will consolidate at 6 Kellow Place, Wiri, Auckland, becoming our new, centralised head office.



On the same date, three Manna stores in Mt Roskill (Auckland), Whangarei, and Nelson will be closed. Sustaining these retail operations has been financially challenging for some time. Additional closures of Invercargill, Gore and Hawkes Bay stores will follow by 31 May 2024.

Prayerful Deliberation: These decisions have resulted from long and prayerful consideration. We recognise the profound impact on our team members and the communities we serve, and carry this responsibility with the utmost empathy and understanding. Making these changes has become a challenging yet inevitable step to ensure the continued vitality of our mission.

Your involvement could be crucial in preserving the essence of these community spaces, albeit Bible Society New Zealand can no longer financially sustain these operations.
