Our people and their stories - Barbara McCook

Barbara is a member of the Baptist Fellowship and is known to many of us as the mother of Ross McCook, who sometimes leads our worship. Until very recently, Barbara has faithfully served in the men's room at the Church Opshop, a post she was very sad to relinquish due to the remodelling.

Barbara's ancestors were early settlers in NZ, three Bayly brothers (spelled correctly) and their wives arriving on the *Amelia Thompson* in 1840. The Baylys were farmers in Taranaki.

Barbara was born in Tauranga but at age 3



moved to Orakei, Auckland where her father worked with BNZ in Queen Street. Her Mum was Anglican and took Barbara and her sister Vivienne (six years younger) to St James' Church in Orakei. Vivienne was 6 and Barbara 12 when their Mum died. Barbara has memories of her Mum teaching her to use the sewing machine. After Mum died Barbara made clothes for herself and her sister. A series of housekeepers lived in to look after the family. Barbara was confirmed at St James Anglican, but at her all-important first Communion she fainted and had to be taken out. She went to Auckland Girls' Grammar but left at 15 to become a seamstress, a job she really loved. She was very talented and worked on Norman Hartnell designs. She went to night school to learn pattern making and was put in charge of the cutting section at Milne and Choice in Parnell.

By the age of 18 Barbara was flatting with friends and attending church at St Aiden's in Remuera. "I think it was just somewhere to go, where I could dress up and wear a nice hat," Barbara says.

They went to dances together and one Christmas, on holiday with friends at Kawau Island, a handsome young man got off a boat at the jetty. "We were all at the dance at the Mansion House, and this young man asked me to dance. He was very nice." So began her lifetime romance with Scott McCook. He was widowed, with a young son, Neville. It took a while for them to tie the knot – 3 years later, in 1958 at St Aiden's in Remuera. Barbara's wedding dress was made by the famous designer, Bruce Papadopoulos (known as Papas). A beautiful gown of white tulle over pink satin. The new family lived at Northcote. Scott worked on Harbour Board vessels and Barbara continued with her dressmaking at home. They had two more sons, Alan and Ross.

Barbara was experiencing headaches and told her neighbour, Jewel, about them. Jewel invited Barbara to a church coffee group, where women shared their testimonies and prayed for healing. Some were speaking in tongues, and Barbara was intrigued. Jewel lent her a book about it. With Jewel, she went to the Auckland Revival Centre, in the RSA Hall in Takapuna. "I had never seen such a happy group of people," Barbara says. "They were absolutely bursting with Joy. I really didn't understand it.

"One day, sitting at my sewing machine I noticed the tiny new leaves on the willow tree, and I was struck by its beauty. Suddenly I found myself murmuring a few words that I didn't understand. They just came out. I felt I had been touched by the Holy Spirit." Barbara understood she had been given a Spiritual gift, but she was still full of questions. "There is a verse in the Bible that says 'tongues are a sign to the unbeliever'. In the Bible I found answers to all my questions."

Barbara didn't know how her husband would react to all this. "I didn't know how to tell Scott, but the Lord had other ideas. Scott began to tell everyone, that I had 'gone religious'. He didn't mind the new me. He saw that I was happy, and even the boys noticed that I was a lot happier in the mornings. I decided that I wanted to be baptised by total immersion. Scott argued that I was already baptised as a child. But he didn't object after I said this was not my parents' decision, it was mine."

Before the new church was built there was no baptismal pool, so Barbara was baptised in the bath at the home of a fellowship member. "It was amazing. Pastor Fred Needham was working with Hell's Angels. One of their leaders, Wayne Thomas was at my baptism with others, all in their leathers and boots. I tried to look elegant as I went under the water!"

I tried to explain to the boys the things that God was doing in my life. One day Alan came home from school and said, "Were you praying for me today?" I said yes. "I thought so," he said, "I actually enjoyed maths today." The new Auckland Revival Centre was built in Glenfield Road, Takapuna. Slowly and surely the Lord worked through Barbara's witnessing to the family. "Neville's wife Patricia was the first to be baptised, then Neville." Barbara's husband Scott had always regretted that he was never Christened as a child. Scott too, was later baptised at the new church.

"I was amazed how almost all the people in my family came to the Lord. I am amazed every day, at how the Lord works in people's lives." Fifty years ago, Scott and Barbara built two units in Whitianga, when Cook Drive was just being developed. "For years we came with the three boys. Ross had a little motor bike when he was twelve, and he made tracks through the waste ground next door." Ross came to the Lord at age 16, when the family went to the church's annual Easter camp at Ruakaka. Scott retired early from his job on the Auckland Harbour Pilot launch and eventually he and Barbara retired to Whitianga.

Barbara was reluctant to leave church friends and family in Auckland, but they soon got into the community. Both joined the MB Golf Club and Scott was also an ace tennis player. Barbara joined Whitianga Baptist Church, and she became a Lioness.

Scott died 18 years ago. Barbara's faith has never wavered since the Lord surprised her with the beauty of the willow and the Gift of Tongues. She delights in the Lord every day, and takes pride in what the Lord is doing through her son Ross and his *Heart for Youth Trust*, taking the Gospel to young people in every way possible. Ross is now married to Susan (Barbara made her wedding dress) and together they are a powerful Christian witness. It runs in the family!

Barbara now has 6 grandchildren and 5 great-grandies. "I look back and see how the Lord has worked in my life and in those around me, and I feel very blessed with my children and grandchildren."

Thank you Barbara, for all your work, and sharing your faith story with us.
