Our People and their Stories: Robin Lee

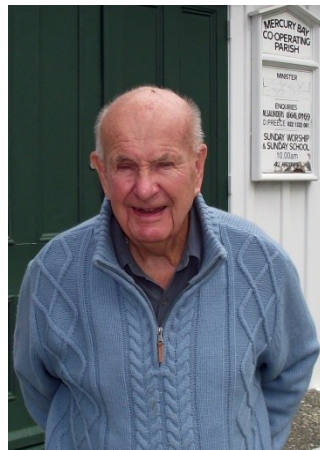
When Robin was born in 1936, Whitianga township was still in its infancy. There were no cars and no electricity. So when his mother, Beryl went into labour, his father, Otto, put her in the dinghy and rowed her along the beach to the hospital. It was either that or walk!

The family home was in Owen Street, right opposite the church. Robin was 'the baby' of 5 children, and church attendance was compulsory – especially when Grandfather William Lee was preaching. Sunday School and Bible Class were compulsory too, The Bible Class leader was Frank Broad, who also

organised the choir, and Mrs Broad played the organ. Robin's three sisters had to clean the church on Saturdays. The church was lit by kerosene lamps which his father, Otto kept trimmed and lit. Otto also rang the bell before service.

One of his earliest memories was being in the dinghy with his Grandfather, going to Grandad William's farm up the estuary (now Bill Lee's farm). "There was a strong wind blowing and it was hard rowing. So my Grandad cut a branch off a mangrove tree and used it like a sail. We flew along. It was great! I think that's where I got my love of boats and sailing."

Robin's Dad earned a living wherever he could find work, building roads for the council or wherever else. "We were not a wealthy family," Robin says. "I didn't like going to school. It seemed to me that most folk were better off than us, plus I was left-handed and the teachers made my life miserable." Life got a bit better in 1951 when the new High School opened on South Highway. Robin was one of the first intake of 12 students. The headmaster was Mr Paul Taylor. Robin was a year older



than the others after diphtheria put him in Thames hospital and in recovery for almost a year. "The only way anyone could visit me was by bus."

Leaving school, Robin worked for Smith and Ross, the grocers, later to become IGA, where Subway and Fagans Flooring now stand. "The policeman's daughter did the office work, and she was running a betting book at the same time." Robin didn't enjoy delivering groceries on his bike, but he learned to bone out the bacon.

At 18, he was called up for military service at Papakura Camp, where his bacon boning skills were much admired on cookhouse duty. Back home in the Bay, he worked painting houses with Ray Bruce, and fishing on Ray Bronlund's boat. "It wasn't a fishing boat. It was built to carry cream from the farms on the rivers and canals of the Hauraki Plains."

Robin then worked with Howard Pascoe, the boat builder with a boatshed on the beach at the end of Dundas Street.

It was through the Pascoe family that Robin met his wife, Gladys Buckton. Gladys was a churchgoer, and they attended together. By this time Robin had "saved a few bob and bought a boat." It was a mullet boat, hard to handle with its big sail. "We had good times up and down the coast in that boat, and Gladys was the best crew. She did what she was told."

In 1962 Robin and Gladys were married in the church by Rev McCullum. Robin sold the boat and bought a section in White Street. Then Robin set to, building a home.

"A job came up at the Mercury Bay Dairy Company, just two days a week working in the hardware store, selling farming supplies. I got the job, and that gave me time to build the house." The job soon became three days a week, then full-time. But the house got built.

Robin and Gladys had three sons, first Jonathan, then Christopher, then Michael. Robin had no experience with office work, but in his job as store keeper he soon became the de-facto manager. "Managers came and went, but none of them were any good, and I was always left with it. Over the time I worked there, the company was bought and sold four times – and me with it!"

Robin worked at the Dairy Company store for the rest of his working life. He saw many people come and go, including a young lady called Annie Lynch, well known to us all. Our friend Annie had already been off on her big OE and had returned home. She then left the job and went to Auckland, but she came back to the Dairy Company again, and Robin was still there. He

says Annie was a good employee. She says he was a pretty good Boss, too. Over the years Robin built a couple of strip-planked trailer-sailors, and his son Mike got into sailing with him around the Bay.

In 1986 Robin took redundancy and was finally able to buy a piece of land.

"I always wanted to buy land and live on it, but my father was always against it. Now I could do it, I bought the land at Mill Creek. Then one day I came home and Gladys announced, 'I bought a house today!'"

Gladys had bought an old house on Whitianga's main street.

"It was very close to Christmas, and we had three weeks to get it shifted from town to Mill Creek. They had to cut it in half to move it. It took me about two years to patch it back together. Then we moved out of town and sold the house in White Street. We were rich!"

Gladys died in 2015 and Robin now lives alone with his flock of chooks ("too many roosters!") and grows his own vegetables. He has very good neighbours living close by.

With the Lee family roots so entrenched in the area, Robin is very clued up on local history, but that is only one of his interests. Last year Robin spoke at the Historical Society on the subject of 'Ship Wrecks Around the Coromandel'. He reads widely and has a formidable memory, but it takes a lot to get him to speak publicly. Robin has spent many hours hiking through the bush and has a wide knowledge of local flora and fauna, but his hiking had to stop last year when he developed heart problems. "Suddenly the hills have got steeper," Robin says. These days he enjoys a soak at The Lost Spring.

During his lifetime Robin has seen many Ministers come and go at church, "some good, some not so good." Robin is in church every Sunday. Now, as a 'Local Ministry Team' with no ordained Minister, Robin is enjoying the variety of preaching styles and the friendly Fellowship.

"I enjoy most of the preachers, and we have some good discussions over morning tea. They're good people here."

The permanent shade cover is now installed on the church side deck.

It is bolted to the deck and has adjustable, weatherproof louvres.

By providing shade it will make the deck more usable for events and outdoor activities. The structure cost \$4,242 and it arrived in kitset form. ***Grateful thanks to the construction gang – Peter, Kevin, Vance and John.***

A new commercial gas stove to replace the old one, has been kindly donated to the Manawa Kai meals mission, and is now installed in St Andrew's kitchen.

It has taken two years to find a joiner who will take on the removal of dry **rot from one of the church window frames**. We are hopeful that we have now found the right person for the job. Watch this space!

The carpet in the church lounge and Hamilton Room has been cleaned.

Cost was \$670.00. A team of willing helpers turned out to remove all the furniture and sort chairs for cleaning, and then put it all back again for Sunday morning. ***Thank you Team!***

Message from NZ Bible Society



Kia ora Mission Partners,

We're excited to share two important reports that offer fresh insight into Bible engagement, both globally and here in Aotearoa, New Zealand.

The Patmos World Bible Attitudes Survey

This global study, led by the British and Foreign Bible Society and Gallup, was made possible thanks to support from many Bible Societies, including ours. It examines how different cultures view the Bible.

One section, Cluster 5, reflects our situation here in New Zealand:

A highly developed, formerly Christian country where fewer people engage with Scripture, and Christian identity is in decline. While many still identify as Christian, lots of people feel the Bible is irrelevant to their personal lives or society. This backs up what we've found in Bible Society New Zealand's last research released in 2024, giving us a clearer picture of both the challenges and the opportunities as we share God's Word.

The Quiet Revival

This encouraging report from BFBS focuses on growth in the Church, especially among Gen Z men. Similar trends are being seen by the American Bible Society. It's a great reminder that God is still moving, even in unexpected places.

Shirley has provided a list of suggested topics, and these choices are being circulated in hard copy or by email. Please respond as soon as you can.

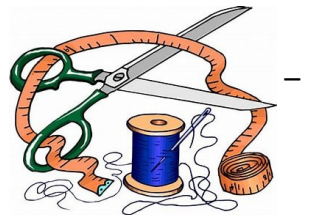
'Made by Hand' Craft Weekend
