Our People and their Stories: Dorothy Pooley (née Lee)

Dorothy now lives in Melbourne, but she regularly visits back to her old stamping ground, revisiting very strong family roots and the church that her family helped to build. The church that has played such an integral part of her family life.

Dorothy is cousin to Alex Hamilton, who also comes back to visit us every summer from Queensland. They are both welcomed with open arms whenever they appear in the district and at St Andrew's but their visits rarely coincide.

This year, Dorothy was invited to speak at the Historical Society meeting. The venue at the Lost Spring was crowded with people, half of them related to her! Dorothy's fascinating talk was about the trees that the early settler families grew around town. She was using her father's notes, handwritten in a historic note book. "I've never taken my father's things to Aussie, they belong here," Dorothy said.

The old map that she displayed, from 1880, showed just 14 houses in the township! That was just five years before our church was built.

Dorothy was born in Whitianga in 1940. Her parents were Alfred and Iris Lee (née Hamilton) and those early settler families were very close knit by intermarriage. Dorothy's family lived on a dairy farm at Moewai Road, Whitianga, which now has the airfield on one side and the golf club on the other. Her father, Alf Lee bought the first 100 acres on the golf club side from his uncle, with the help of a private loan from Mr Lyon, who bequeathed Lyon Park to the town.

The second 100 acres on the airfield side were purchased from Mr Wood. Milk from their cows went to the Mercury Bay dairy factory (now the Museum).

Dorothy was born during wartime, when many of her older Hamilton and Lee cousins were away at war. "We never tasted chocolate or a banana until the war ended." Dorothy says. "Clothes were home-made and much of our food was home-grown. Auntie Phyl made our clothes, and my father made my toys. Other toys were passed down from cousins. The families all shared what they had, meat, eggs or fresh veges. Two of my uncles grew a lot of veges at their place on the Tairua Hill. My Dad had a boat, the *Waihaka*, and often went fishing. There were always loads of fish in the Bay, and the fish was shared around. I loved going out on the boat."

Dorothy had one brother, Graham who sadly died in a farming accident at age 39.

The children went to Sunday School every week at the 'Undenominational Church' (now St Andrew's). "Grandad William Lee was the Sunday School Superintendent, and he would have been very displeased if we didn't go." Their parents, Alf and Iris didn't often go to church.

"Auntie Ella Lee played the organ. She lived with Auntie Doris in the Lee family home in Campbell Street. One of our teachers was Mary Smith, who lived on the farm on South Highway. That farm is now part of the Whitianga Waterways."

There were many chances for the extended families to get together, but they were usually community events rather than family celebrations. "If they were raising money for something, like after the war when they were raising funds to build the Whenuakite Hall as a War Memorial, they would hold Paddy's Markets, and everyone in the district would turn out. We'd meet all the cousins at those times."

Dorothy went to school in Whitianga, and then on to Ardmore Teachers' Training College. While there she met a young engineering student at a nearby college, Don Pooley, whom she married at the Whitianga Undenominational Church in 1964. Auntie Phyl made her wedding dress, and a couple of years ago, at our first 'Made by Hand' craft exhibition, Dorothy sent her wedding dress over from Melbourne. It had pride of display space at the back of the church.

The newly-weds lived for five years in Tokoroa, where Dorothy joined the local Presbyterian Church. Don was not a church-goer. "He sometimes made derogatory comments, but I didn't let it worry me." Baby Michael was born in Tokoroa.

In 1969 they moved to Melbourne, where Don was employed by Bechtel Pacific Corporation. Soon after their move to Australia Don helped to commission the new nickel refinery south of Perth.

The move was not an easy one for Dorothy, with such a big, supportive family left behind in Whitianga.

"I was on my own a lot of the time, because Don's work often took him away from home, but I joined the local church and I found there another faith family to belong to." Dorothy came home for the birth of their second son, Trevor. She took a teaching job in Australia but didn't teach for very long. Don died when he was 63, and she has now been alone for 22 years. "I have been blessed with many good friends through the church and in the community, and although I am no longer allowed to drive, I am very well looked after. I count my blessings every day."

Dorothy now has four grandchildren in Australia, one of whom wants to be an engineer, like his Granddad.

"My faith has always been a big part of my life, and it has always helped me through. It's always a joy to come back to Whitianga and I will continue to do so as long as I am able."

We decided that we are a very caring congregation but not really organised. So there was potential for people to slip through the cracks, for loneliness or health problems to go unnoticed.

We resolved to get organised. We had already set up local Fellowship phone lists during Covid, and after the AGM Christine Christie and Debbie Gordon began to update the lists to make sure these contacts were maintained.

The idea is for the *Fellowship Link* team to keep regular contact with their people, either by phone or email, to be a friendly voice and a listening ear, and to make sure no-one feels they are without a friend to talk to.

On January 23rd the *Fellowship Link* team got together to set parameters and find the best way forward. It was a good meeting.

We are aware that we are an aging congregation, and sometimes people need more than just a friendly chat. Debbie has approached several health and wellbeing agencies who provide support in the local area and could be helpful in a variety of needs, such as home help and mobility issues.
